Notice of Public Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulation

August 22, 2016

The Kansas State Board of Education will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m., or as soon thereafter as possible, on Wednesday, November 9, 2016, in the Board Room of the Landon State Office Building, 900 SW Jackson Ave., Suite 102, Topeka, Kansas, to consider the adoption of a proposed rule and regulation of the Kansas State Board of Education on a permanent basis.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of the Kansas State Board of Education at the below addresses or by email to <u>plhill@ksde.org</u>. The address for the Kansas State Board of Education is Landon State Office Building, 900 SW Jackson Ave., Suite 102, Topeka, Kansas 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally regarding the adoption of the proposed regulation during the public hearing. In order to provide all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes. The hearing shall be conducted in compliance with the public hearing procedures of the Kansas State Board of Education.

Any individual with a disability may request an accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing, and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. The north entrance to the Landon State Office Building is accessible. Handicapped parking is located at the south end of the Landon State Office Building, across the street from the north entrance to the building, and on Ninth Street, just around the corner from the north entrance to the building.

K.A.R. 91-31-32

This regulation describes the Performance and Quality Criteria each school must meet in order to maintain its status of accreditation by the Kansas State Board of Education. The proposed amendment to K.A.R. 91-31-32 adds a requirement for all accredited schools to provide suicide awareness and prevention training to all staff. The regulation will require at least one hour of training per calendar year. This training may be accomplished through independent self-review of online training materials. The training must also include a building crisis plan for RECEIVED

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each school building in case staff recognizes the need to intervene to prevent and/or respond to a student suicide. The proposed amendment to K.A.R. 91-31-32 will have no economic impact on schools beyond what is already required by the Jason Flatt Act (SB 323) (2016), which imposes the same requirements on schools since May 19th, 2016.

The Kansas State Board of Education does not anticipate any significant financial or economic impact with the proposed regulation.

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91-31-32. Performance and quality criteria. (a) Each school shall be assigned its accreditation status based upon the extent to which the school has met the performance and quality criteria established by the state board in this regulation.

(b) The performance criteria shall be as follows:

(1) Except as provided in subsection (d), having met the percentage prescribed by the state board of students performing at or above the proficient level on state assessments or having increased overall student achievement by a percentage prescribed by the state board;

(2) having 95% or more of all students and 95% or more of each student subgroup take the state assessments;

(3) having an attendance rate equal to or greater than that prescribed by the state board; and

(4) for high schools, having a graduation rate equal to or greater than that prescribed by the state board.

(c) The quality criteria shall consist of the following quality measures, which shall be required to be in place at each school:

(1) A school improvement plan that includes a results-based staff development plan;

(2) an external technical assistance team;

(3) locally determined assessments that are aligned with the state standards;

(4) formal training for teachers regarding the state assessments and curriculum standards;

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(5) 100% of the teachers assigned to teach in those areas assessed by the state or described as core academic subjects by the United States department of education, and 95% or more of all other faculty, fully certified for the positions they hold;

(6) policies that meet the requirements of S.B.R. 91-31-34;

(7) local graduation requirements that include at least those requirements imposed by the state board;

(8) curricula that allow each student to meet the regent's qualified admissions

requirements and the state scholarship program;

(9) programs and services to support student learning and growth at both the elementary and secondary levels, including the following:

(A) Computer literacy;

- (B) counseling services;
- (C) fine arts;
- (D) language arts;
- (E) library services;
- (F) mathematics;

(G) physical education, which shall include instruction in health and human sexuality;

(H) science;

(I) services for students with special learning needs; and

(J) history, government, and celebrate freedom week. Each local board of education shall

include the following in its history and government curriculum:

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(i) Within one of the grades seven through 12, a course of instruction in Kansas history and government. The course of instruction shall be offered for at least nine consecutive weeks. The local board of education shall waive this requirement for any student who transfers into the district at a grade level above that in which the course is taught; and

(ii) for grades kindergarten through eight, instruction concerning the original intent, meaning, and importance of the declaration of independence and the United States constitution, including the bill of rights, in their historical contexts, pursuant to L. 2013, ch. 121, sec. 2 K.S.A. 2015 Supp. 72-1130 and amendments thereto. The study of the declaration of independence shall include the study of the relationship of the ideas expressed in that document to subsequent American history;

(10) programs and services to support student learning and growth at the secondary level, including the following:

(A) Business;

(B) family and consumer science;

(C) foreign language; and

(D) industrial and technical education; and

(11) local policies ensuring compliance with other accreditation regulations and state education laws; and

(12) programs for all school staff regarding suicide awareness and prevention. Each local board of education shall include the following in its suicide awareness and prevention programs:

OF ADMINISTRATION (A) At least one hour of training each calendar year based on programs approved by the state board of education. The training requirement may be met through independent self-review of suicide prevention training material; and

(B) a building crisis plan developed for each school building. The building crisis plan shall include the following:

(i) Steps for recognizing suicide ideation;

(ii) appropriate methods of intervention; and

(iii) a crisis recovery plan.

(d) If the grade configuration of a school does not include any of the grades included in the state assessment program, the school shall use an assessment that is aligned with the state standards. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution and K.S.A. 2013 2015 Supp. 72-1130; effective July 1, 2005; amended Jan. 10, 2014; amended P-______.)

KANSAS STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION ECONOMIC IMPACT STATEMENT K.A.R. 91-31-32

I. Summary of Proposed Regulation, Including Its Purpose.

K.A.R. 91-31-32 is an amended regulation which adds a requirement for all accredited K-12 schools in Kansas to provide suicide awareness and prevention training to all staff. The amendment also requires schools to develop building crisis plans in case there is a need to intervene and/or respond to a student suicide.

II. Reason or Reasons the Proposed Regulation Is Required, Including Whether or Not the Regulation Is Mandated by Federal Law.

The proposed regulation is required by Kansas Senate Bill No. 323 (2016). The regulation is not mandated by federal law.

III. Anticipated Economic Impact upon the Kansas State Board of Education.

There is no anticipated economic impact to the Kansas State Board of Education. Kansas State Department of Education staff will work with schools to develop the required training and crisis plans, but that will not create a serious burden on the agency.

IV. Anticipated Financial Impact upon Other Governmental Agencies and upon Private Business or Individuals.

The Board does not anticipate economic impact on other governmental agencies, or on private businesses or individuals.

V. Anticipated Economic Impact upon School Districts, Following Consultation with the Kansas Association of School Boards.

Adoption of this regulation is anticipated to have a minimal economic impact upon school districts, if any. Suicide prevention training materials are made available by many

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organizations for free, including the Jason Flatt Foundation. Schools already face the economic impact of this regulation amendment due to the Jason Flatt Act's (SB 323) imposition of the same requirements.

VI. Less Costly or Intrusive Methods That Were Considered, but Rejected, and the Reason for Rejection.

There were no other methods considered, as there are none available. The original draft of SB 323 required suicide training as a requirement to obtain a teaching license. That bill (and subsequently this regulation amendment) was amended to require all staff to receive training, not just the licensed faculty.

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
