#### Notice of Public Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted on December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2020 at 9:30 a.m. to consider the adoption of proposed amendments to regulation 69-3-8. During the hearing, all interested individuals will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the proposed regulation. If an individual wishes to give oral comment during the remote hearing, provide a written copy of the comment to the email or postal mailing address or fax number listed below. In order to give each individual an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary for the hearing officer to request that each presenter limit an oral presentation to an appropriate time frame.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Kansas Board of Cosmetology, 714 SW Jackson, Jayhawk Walk Building, Suite 100, Topeka, Kansas, 66603-3714 or by email to aubrie.pryer@ks.gov.

Any individual with a disability may request an accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statements in an accessible format. **K.A.R. 69-3-8** – **Curricula and credits.** The Board is seeking this regulation change to allow both the in-person classroom and distance learning for theory hours and allow credit for any duplicate hours between programs instead of limiting the hours that may be credited.

**Economic Impact.** The Board anticipates that there should be little, if any, economic impact to State and local governments due to this regulation.

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SCOTT SCHWAB SECRETARY OF STATE 69-3-8. Curriculum Curricula and credits. (a) The curriculum requirements entitled "Cosmetology School Course Curriculums," document titled "cosmetology school course curricula," as in effect on June 1, 1996, as approved by the board on July 24, 2020, is hereby adopted by reference.

(b) Among other teaching tools used to provide a course of training, a <u>each cosmetology</u> school shall use a textbook which <u>that</u> substantially covers the curriculum areas.

(c) Any instructional classroom may be a place where theory instruction is provided in a traditional classroom setting or in a distance education format.

(c) (d) A person who has completed a course of manicuring training may receive 180 elock hours credit in manicuring which may apply toward completion of a course of cosmetology training. Any cosmetology school may submit for approval of the board duplicate hours obtained by a student during the completion of manicuring training or esthetics training for credit toward completion of a course of cosmetology training.

(d) A person who has completed a course in esthetics training may receive 150 clock hours credit in facials and make up which may apply toward completion of a course of cosmetology training. The Board is seeking this regulation change to define "instruction classroom" in order to continue to allow both the in-person classroom and distance learning for theory hours and allow credit for any duplicate hours between programs instead of limiting the hours that may be credited.

#### II. This regulation is not mandated by the federal government. Oklahoma and 11 other states allow for distance learning education for the theory portions of the cosmetology professions. The Board reviewed a submission from a cosmetology school outlining possible duplicate hours between programs that are applicable apart from the limitations specified in the regulation currently. The Board agreed that the hours could be credited but was unable to approve the duplicate hours due to the currently limitations in the regulation. The Board directed staff to seek the regulation change.

This regulation will enhance business activities and growth by providing the flexibility for Kansas schools to offer distance education options for students in the cosmetology profession for the theory portions of the curriculum.
