#### Notice of Public Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

The Kansas State Board of Examiners in Optometry will conduct a public hearing on Wednesday, October 18, 2023, at 1:00 p.m., in the Kansas State Capitol, Committee Room 218-N, 310 SW 10<sup>th</sup> St., Topeka, KS 66612, to consider the adoption of the proposed regulations K.A.R. 65-4-4 and 65-5-4 of the Kansas State Board of Examiners in Optometry on a permanent basis.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing by mailing them to the Kansas Board of Examiners in Optometry, 3109 W 6<sup>th</sup> St., Suite A, Lawrence, KS 66049 or by email to <u>kssbeo@ks.gov</u>. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally regarding the adoption of the proposed regulations during the public hearing. In order to provide all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to ask that each participant limit any oral presentation to an appropriate time frame.

A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impacts are as follows:

K.A.R. 65-4-4 – Notice to the Board. K.A.R. 65-4-4 is an amended permanent regulation that updates notifications made to the Board.

Economic Impact: The adoption of this regulation has no economic impact. There is no environmental impact.

K.A.R. 65-5-4 – Approved schools or colleges of optometry. K.A.R. 65-5-4 is an amended permanent regulation that updates requirements for an approved school or college of optometry.

Economic Impact: The adoption of this regulation has no economic impact. There is no environmental impact.

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**65-4-4. Notice to board**. A licensee shall provide notice to the board, in writing, within 20 days of the following:

(a) The licensee's conviction of a felony, whether or not related to the practice of optometry;

(b) the revocation, suspension or limitation of a licensee's license to practice optometry in another state, territory, nation or the District of Columbia;

(c) the censure of the licensee by the proper licensing authority of another state, territory, nation or the District of Columbia;

(d) a finding by a court of competent jurisdiction that the licensee is mentally ill, disabled, not guilty by reason of insanity or incompetent to stand trial;

(e) sanctions or disciplinary actions taken against the licensee by a peer review committee, medical care facility or professional association or society;

(f) adverse action for acts or conduct similar to acts or conduct which would constitute grounds for disciplinary action <u>pursuant to K.S.A. 65-1517</u>, and <u>amendments</u> <u>thereto</u>, under the optometry law taken against the licensee by another state or licensing jurisdiction, a peer review body, a medical care facility, a professional association or society, a governmental agency, by a law enforcement agency, or a court;

(g) surrender of the licensee's license or authorization to practice optometry in another state, <u>territory</u>, <u>nation or the District of Columbia</u>, <del>or jurisdiction</del>or surrender of the licensee's membership on any professional staff, or in any professional association or society;

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(h) an adverse judgment, award, or settlement against the licensee resulting from a medical liability claim;

(i) any change in contact information to receive notifications from the Board including physical address, electronic mail address, and phone number. 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**65-5-4.** Approved schools or colleges of optometry. An approved school or college of optometry shall be a school or college that has been determined by the board to accredited by the Accreditation Council on Optometric Education (ACOE), at least meet the standard of the University of Missouri-St. Louis school of optometry as they existed on January 1, 1991. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-1504(a)(6) and K.SA. 65-1505; implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp.65-1505; effective May 18, 1992; amended P -


