Notice of Public Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted on Tuesday, January 15, 2019, at 9:30 a.m. in the board room at the Kansas State Board of Healing Arts, 800 SW Jackson, Lower Level – Suite A, Topeka, Kansas, to consider an amended regulation related to the practice by Physician Assistants.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the regulation. All interested parties may submit comments prior to the hearing to Tucker Poling, General Counsel, at the Board of Healing Arts at the address above, or via e-mail to KSBHA-HealingArts@ks.gov. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the amended regulation during the public hearing. In order to provide all parties with an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

A summary of the amended regulation and the economic impact follows:

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K.A.R. 100-28a-14. Different practice location This regulation revises availability requirements for a supervising or substitute supervising physician of a physician assistant at different practice locations.

The revised regulation is more flexible and less restrictive. It is therefore likely to reduce compliance and hiring costs for affected businesses. No additional costs are expected.

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100-28a-14. Different practice location. Any physician assistant may perform acts that constitute the practice of medicine and surgery at a different practice location if all of the following requirements are met:

- (a) Before providing any services at the different practice location, the physician assistant shall have spent at least 80 hours since being licensed under the direct supervision of a physician licensed in this state.
- (b) A physician licensed in this state shall provide medical care to patients in person at the different practice location at least once every 30 days. The supervising physician or substitute supervising physician shall remain available to provide guidance, direction, and coordination of the activities of the physician assistant. This availability may be provided by electronic means.
- (c) The different practice location shall be listed on the active practice request form required by K.A.R. 100-28a-9.
- (d) Written notice that the different practice location is staffed primarily by a physician assistant shall be posted in a location where the notice is likely to be seen by patients.

This regulation revises availability requirements for a supervising or substitute physician of a physician assistant at different practice locations.

The revised regulation makes the requirement less restrictive. The revision is likely to enhance business activity because it allows for more flexibility.

Although the agency does not employ an economist, the lay opinion of the agency staff is that the economic effect on the affected businesses and business sector

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would be positive. The revised regulation is more flexible and less restrictive. It is therefore likely to reduce compliance and hiring costs for affected businesses.

C. Businesses that would be directly affected by the proposed rule and regulation;

Businesses that employ physician assistants.

The benefit of the revision is that it allows for more flexibility including availability by electronic means. No additional costs are expected.

This revision is itself a measure taken by the agency to minimize the cost and impact of a regulation on business and economic development while maintaining a high standard of public protection.
