Edith L. Stunkel, MSW



Edith Leverenz Stunkel was to gerontology what Orville Redenbacher was to popcorn. An enthusiastic, approachable ambassador with a mission to convert others to the importance of enhancing the lives of older adults, she was a strong advocate and believer in the power of social justice. She was active in politics at the local level through the League of Women Voters, and she served as mayor of Manhattan. She was instrumental in ensuring that issues affecting rural older adults, especially transportation issues, were taken seriously in Topeka and throughout the state. She was an educator at heart. She taught gerontology students and held leadership positions at the Center on Aging at Kansas State University for over 20 years. Through the Western Kansas Community Services Consortium, she worked to bring gerontology curricula to community colleges in western Kansas.

The state of Kansas was her oyster. She could be counted on to collaborate with colleagues at Washburn University, the University of Kansas, Fort Hays State University, and other centers of learning statewide. She founded the Kansas Association for Aging Education and served on the Advisory Council of the Flint Hills Area Agency on Aging. She developed and delivered training on adult abuse and neglect for frontline caregivers throughout Kansas. She served on nursing home boards and in 1997 accepted the position of Director of Planning and Research at the Kansas Association of Homes and Services for the Aging, where she was awarded the KAHSA Lifetime Achievement Award.

Her straightforwardness and gentle laugh were her trademark, along with the french twist that gathered up her just-starting-to-turn gray hair. She earned the respect and admiration of colleagues through her many years of meeting deadlines, exceeding expectations and her uncanny ability to identify and nurture the strengths of others. Edith was a lovely combination of creativity and practicality, which through the years ensured that her colleagues became close friends, and her close friends came to rely on her insight and support.


For her gerontological passion, commitment to political change, and leadership in education and practice, we dedicate this first edition of ElderCount to Edith L. Stunkel.

Thank you for opening this chart book and demonstrating your willingness to learn more about older adults in Kansas. The chart book reflects the work of at least 100 people. In particular, I would like to thank the 32 ElderCount Advisory Committee members (listed on page 2) and the project partners:

- Center on Aging, University of Kansas Medical Center
- Kansas Department on Aging
- Kansas Health Foundation
- Kansas Task Force on Long-Term Care Services
- · Milbank Memorial Fund

Although the bulk of work on the chart book occurred in 2001 and 2002, the actual idea for ElderCount stretches back ten years.

ElderCount can trace its lineage to Kids Count. In 1993, the first version of Kansas Kids Count was published by Kansas Action for Children, Inc. (www.kac.org), with financial support from the Annie E. Casey Foundation. The purpose of Kids Count was—and is—to gather and publicize information on child well-being. As an elected official and policy maker, I relied on data in Kids Count to help me understand the status of children in our state and in our counties. I have seen first hand how Kids Count prompts policy makers to ask questions about the county-to-county variation in measures of well-being. The availability of data in Kids Count continues to motivate discussions among policy makers, program planners and the public about the status of our children. Kids Count data have been used to strengthen public policy in Kansas. I see the same role for ElderCount.

The need for county data describing older adults became abundantly clear at a spring 2000 meeting of the Kansas Task Force on Long-Term Care Services, moderated by Monsignor Charles Fahey of the Milbank Memorial Fund. During the meeting, a wall chart (Aging in Kansas) produced by the Center on Aging at the University of Kansas Medical Center was circulated. The wall chart contained social and demographic data from the 1990 census, at the county level. Task Force members from the Kansas House of Representatives and Senate began looking up their counties on the wall chart and comparing the data among counties. The data stimulated discussion and questions about the status of older adults. My Task Force co-chair, Representative Melvin Neufeld, and I decided that the legislature, program planners, and the public needed an older adult version of Kids Count.

In the fall of 2000, The Kansas Health Foundation, a Wichita-based philanthropic organization dedicated to improving the health of all Kansans, awarded funding to the Center on Aging at KU Medical Center to spearhead the development of Kansas ElderCount. I met with Stephanie Studenski, director of the Center on Aging at the time, and shared with her my vision for ElderCount. She assigned Center on Aging staff member Mercedes Bern-Klug, a social worker and demographer, to direct the project. Mercedes convened a statewide Advisory Committee to help identify, prioritize, and secure data. The Advisory Committee decided to augment the chart book with a wall chart that would include additional data. This chart book and the accompanying wall chart can be found on the Web at: http://www2.kumc.edu/coa/eldercount.

I am grateful to the Milbank Memorial Fund, in particular to Daniel M. Fox, president, for offering to publish ElderCount. Dr. Fox was instrumental in another Kansas research project that dovetails with ElderCount. On July 11, 2002, the Employee Benefit Research Institute (EBRI) and the Milbank Memorial Fund presented results of a groundbreaking study

projecting retirement income adequacy of Kansans currently between the ages of 33 and 66. The project suggests to the governor and the Task Force that by 2031, there could be a \$700 million annual deficit in resources to meet the daily living needs (including health and long-term care costs) of older Kansans. This report helps to underscore the need for data that describe our Kansas population and can help inform policy decisions necessary to prepare for the coming decades.

The Kansas Department on Aging, in particular Secretary Connie Hubbell and Deputy Secretary/ Commissioner Janis DeBoer, are to be commended for their support and work on behalf of both the EBRI report and ElderCount. They are doing an excellent job striving to understand the issues facing older Kansans and crafting solutions to meet those needs.

Representatives from Kansas ElderCount spoke before the House and Senate Health Committees in 2001 and 2002. Committee members repeatedly commented on the need for data to help them understand long-term care needs of Kansans living at home and in nursing homes. Because of the many questions about long-term care insurance from members of the Health Committees, as part of ElderCount we mailed a survey to insurance companies licensed to sell long-term care insurance in Kansas. The results of that survey are reported on page 8.

I'd also like to thank Randolph Nudo, Interim Director, Center on Aging at the University of Kansas Medical Center, for his enthusiasm and support on behalf of Kansas ElderCount, and Mercedes Bern-Klug for her leadership on the project.

Please take a moment and complete the "feedback form" in the back of the chart book and tell us what you think about it. We are considering publishing ElderCount every five years, if Kansans find it useful.

Long-Term Care Insurance

Members of the Kansas Legislature view the purchase of long-term care insurance, by citizens, as one of the ways in which to ensure access to care and keep state expenditures down.

No county level data on long-term care insurance are available. ElderCount collected state data to begin informing the legislature.

Long-Term Care Insurance in Kansas: 2000

The majority of older adults in the U.S. report being healthy and able to perform daily activities without the help of other people. While most older adults are independent, the need for help from others does increase with age. The use of assistive devices and help from family and friends allows many older adults to continue living in their homes as they age. But some people will need more help than is available informally. Formal long-term care services are available in Kansas through community-based services, supportive housing (e.g. assisted living and residential board and care homes), and through nursing homes.

Long-term care (LTC) can be expensive. Our state and federal policies require that people pay the full cost or part of the cost of their own long-term care needs until they have no available financial resources. Individuals meet their long-term care expenses out of their own pockets, or through the purchase of private long-term care insurance. When individuals can document that their financial resources have been exhausted, there are state and federal programs that can help with costs. The availability of LTC services varies by county. Rural counties, as a rule, have fewer formal LTC options.

Members of the Kansas Legislature grapple with the most cost-effective way to fund long-term care services for older adults who have limited financial resources. Legislators face important decisions about how much state funding should go toward providing care to people who live at home, and how much financial support should be available to people in nursing homes.

When presenting ideas for ElderCount before the House and Senate health committees in 2001 and in 2002, most of the questions from legislators concerned long-term care insurance. Many legislators believe that if more people purchased LTC insurance, the state would save money on LTC costs. Many legislators are wondering if the state should provide some incentive for adults of all ages to purchase long-term care insurance.

To begin answering some basic questions about LTC insurance in Kansas, ElderCount worked with the Kansas Insurance Department to devise a 1-page survey to be mailed to all companies that are licensed to sell LTC insurance in Kansas.

Background Information

In 2000, there were 56,523 LTC policies in Kansas, sold by the 50 companies who responded to our survey. About half of policy holders were women. Of all the policies sold, in general, less than 2% of policies were "in claim." In other words, 2% of the policies were paying out benefits in 2000, the other 98% were collecting premiums but not yet paying out benefits.


Type of LTC Insurance

As reported in Figure 1, there are three types of LTC insurance policy coverage: (1) nursing home only; (2) community (in the person's home) only; and (3) a combination nursing home or community. Over 80% of LTC insurance policies include nursing home coverage.

Forty-three percent cover care in a nursing home or at home and 41% cover nursing home care only. Few policies cover care at-home only.

Age of Policy Holders

Long-term care insurance is sold to adults of all ages, up to about age 80. At around age 80, some companies no longer sell long-term care insurance; others will sell it, but the premiums are very expensive. Our data show that in Kansas, 26% (14,377) of the people who had a LTC policy in 2000 were under the age of 65, 42% (23,892) were between the ages of 65 and 74, and 32% (18,254) were age 75 or older.

The table below reports the number of each type of policy sold by the age of the policy holder. Most of the

policies sold to people under age 65 cover LTC in a nursing home or at home, while most policies held by people age 75 or older cover LTC in a nursing home only.

How Were the Data Collected?

In the fall of 2001, a letter signed by Kansas Insurance Commissioner Kathleen Sebelius was mailed to the 74 companies licensed to sell long-term care insurance in Kansas. The letter requested that the company provide information to ElderCount about the number of long-term care (LTC) policies sold in Kansas, the age (in 2000) of the policy holders, the type of LTC coverage sold (nursing home coverage only, community-based coverage only, or combination nursing home and community-based long-term care), and the percent of policies "in claim" in 2000 (policies that were paying out benefits in 2000).

ElderCount received a response from 59 companies (80% response rate). Of the 59 responding companies, 50 had sold LTC policies in Kansas in 2000.

More research is needed to understand the characteristics of people who buy LTC insurance, what are barriers to LTC insurance purchase for people without LTC insurance, and how well LTC insurance helps people meet their LTC needs.

Mission

The mission of Kansas ElderCount is to collect and disseminate data describing the well-being of older adults for the enhancement of public policy, program planning, and general understanding.

Audience

- Program planners and community advocates seeking county-level data that will facilitate their ability to plan and deliver services on behalf of older adults.
- Educators wanting to share information about older adults and the communities in which they live, with students of all ages.
- Kansas State Legislature. State senators and representatives making important policy decisions, in particular concerning the provision of long-term care services, as members of the Baby Boom generation (born 1946-1964) age into older adulthood. It is essential that current and high quality data are available to help legislators make informed policy decisions.

Organization of ElderCount

There are three ElderCount products: the chart book, a wall chart, and a Website. Data in ElderCount are grouped into five categories: population, economics, health, community living, and nursing homes. There are 36 indicators (variables) in the chart book reported for the 105 counties, 11 Area Agencies on Aging (defined on page 19), and the State of Kansas.

In the wall chart, data are reported for counties, and the state. The purpose of the wall chart is to facilitate comparison among counties (the data are presented in columns). There is overlap between the variables in the chart book and the wall chart (although not all chart book variables are on the wall chart). The wall chart also includes variables that are not in the chart book.

The Website contains the entire chart book and the wall chart for people to read on-line or download.

Older Adults

In general, in Kansas ElderCount, people age 65+ and older are called "older adults." In some parts of ElderCount you will notice that a different term for older adults is used, reflecting the preferences of the agency or organization providing the information.

Conceptual Framework

The design of Kansas ElderCount reflects the combination of two perspectives, the "person-inenvironment perspective" and the "strengths perspective."2 The person-in-environment perspective (also called the ecological perspective) suggests that in order to understand the characteristics of people we should seek to understand characteristics of the environment in which they live. The person-inenvironment perspective looks at the extent to which the environment is a good match for the people who live there. In the case of ElderCount, "is the county environment supportive of older adult well-being, independence, and self-determination?" To help answer that question, ElderCount contains information about older adults and the programs that serve older adults.

The strengths perspective is grounded in the belief that all people have strengths and capacities. In the case of ElderCount, this belief challenged us to include county

data describing how older adults contribute to their own

well-being, and also help their families and communities.

Keeping in mind the strengths perspective, we wanted to identify and include data describing the strengths and capacities of older adults in Kansas. We discovered that data describing the strengths of older adults as a group, are not readily available. For example, we did not find any county data to describe the extent to which older adults contribute to their communities through volunteering, or the extent to which older adults help their adult children. Nor were we able to identify any data that illuminated the important role that older adults play in postponing and in some cases preventing the need for nursing home care of a spouse or friend. However, members of the ElderCount Advisory Committee were creative in identifying other strengths of older adults. These include: the number of older adults registered to vote, the number of older adults in the labor force, and the amount of Social Security income of older adults in each county.

The Importance of Age, Gender, and Race in Older Adulthood

Most of the important variables that describe the characteristics of older adults vary by gender, race, and age group. When possible, data in ElderCount are reported by gender and by age group. In some cases, we were not able to report data by gender or age group because the data were not available, or because they were not reportable due to small numbers (explained more fully below). We did not report data by race because most of the counties in Kansas do not have sufficient racial diversity to report data without identifying people. Please bear in mind that although we do not report indicators for men and women age 85+, national data clearly reveal that older women (age 85+) are much more likely to be low income and at risk for long-term care than their younger male counterparts.

Process of Data Selection

The process of identifying, locating, tabulating, and prioritizing data for ElderCount consumed a year and a half. The 32 members of the ElderCount Advisory

Committee were invited to join one of four subcommittees: economics (David Ekerdt, Chair), health (Sam Markello, Chair), community living (Rosemary Chapin, Chair), and nursing homes (Debra Harmon Zehr, Chair). The subcommittees were charged with identifying and ranking variables for consideration by the full Advisory Committee. The final decision for inclusion in ElderCount rested with the subcommittee chair and the project director. In addition to attempting to identify data that would reflect environmental characteristics and data that show the strengths of older adults, subcommittees used the following criteria while considering data for ElderCount:

- the data are available at the county level
- the data are available for the year 2000
- the data source would provide the data to ElderCount
- the data are valid and reliable
- the data are useful for program planning and public policy, in particular long-term care.

Reportability criteria varied by data source. Each data source had its own criteria for releasing data representing small numbers of people. For example, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) provided some of the nursing home data used in ElderCount. CMS has a rule that if fewer than ten people are represented, the data cannot be reported. With nursing home data, for example, many counties had too few people in a category to report the data. In such cases, there were three choices: do not report the variable; combine men and women; or combine age groups.

Because so many rural Kansas counties have low numbers (although high percentages) of older adults, we were not able to report some variables in the degree that would be most useful, without potentially identifying individuals. The Advisory Committee was particularly sensitive to the potential harm of releasing data that could be traced to individuals in light of recently passed federal HIPAA legislation (Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996).

Elder Count Explained

Understanding the Data Tables in the Chart Book

Three levels of geography are reflected in ElderCount: county, Area Agency on Aging, and state.

NUMBER. This is the number of people in the area (i.e., county, AAA, or state) who fit the indicator (variable or category). Please read the data definitions in the back of the chart book to ensure correct interpretation of the data. Because of space limitations, the indicator labels may not be complete.

PERCENT. In most cases (but not in all!), the percent is the number listed on the table beside it, divided by the number of people of the same age and the same sex in the county or AAA. Please read the data definitions to ensure correct understanding of the denominator for each percent.

STATE PERCENT. State data are reflected in the numerator and in the denominator. These data are reported on each page to facilitate comparisons between county or AAA percents and the state percent. While the *number* of people in each category will vary widely by county and by AAA (because of population size) the percents do not generally vary as much. Please keep in mind that differences in percents between the county and the state or the AAA and the state can reflect, in part, different age structures. For example, counties with a higher percentage of people age 85+ would be expected to have a higher percentage of their 65+ population in a nursing home, compared with counties with a lower percentage of their 65+ in the 85+ category.

QUINTILE. For each variable counties are divided into five equal-sized groups, based on the PERCENT of the population in each category. In order to classify counties into 5 groups, with the same number of counties in each group, in some cases 2 counties with values "on the cusp" of the quintile limit, are assigned to different quintiles.

While the numbers reported appear identical, in fact when the numbers to the right of the decimal point are considered, they are not. (We report only one digit to the right of the decimal.) For most variables, data are available for all 105 counties, and we assigned 21 counties per quintile. For some variables, not all counties are included in the quintile rank. For example, if no data were reported for the county, or the value was so low it could not be reported without compromising confidentiality, the county is not ranked. If we do not report the percent, the quintile is calculated based on the number. Counties in quintile 1 have lower percents than counties in quintile 5. Counties in quintile 1 represent the lowest 20% of values. Those in quintile 3 represent the middle 20%. Counties with a quintile rank of 5 represent the top 20% of the value. The quintile ranks in ElderCount reflect differences in percentages. Whether or not these differences are to be interpreted as "better" or "worse" will vary by indicator. Some indicators are "neutral." For example, some counties have a higher percentage of older adults than other counties. Counties with a higher percentage of older adults will be concentrated in quintiles 4 and 5. Counties with high percentages of older adults are neither "better" nor "worse" than counties with lower percentages of older adults. The quintile simply reflects the rank order.

Other indicators are not value neutral; indeed they are value-laden, for example, "living in poverty." Those counties with quintile rank of 4 or 5 have higher percentages of their older adult population in poverty compared to the state average. In this case a high quintile rank is less desirable, and may alert program planners and policy makers to special needs.

For some measures, the quintile rank presents more questions than it answers. High quintile ranks for "living alone" are not straightforward to interpret. People, especially women, age 85 and older are more likely to be living alone than younger people,

to a large degree because of widowhood. It is important to check the age distribution in the county or AAA when trying to make sense of the "living alone" quintile rank. Also, "living alone" can be a proxy for "vulnerability, or high risk for needing help" or it can be a proxy for "achievement and independence." Some counties may have a high percentage of older adults with resources (individual or community) that allow them to live alone as opposed to living in a nursing home.

MAPS. Quintile rankings are mapped for selected variables. In all cases, the highest quintile value of 5 is assigned dark blue, quintile 4 counties are gray, quintile 3 are brick, quintile 2 are stripes, and quintile 1 counties are white.

Caution in Interpreting the Data

In order to keep the font size legible, the labels for the variables are not always complete. Therefore, it is very important to refer to the data definitions section in the back of the chart book.

In pilot testing the data definitions, some people misinterpreted the meaning of the "percent" columns. For all variables in the tables, the "percent" column uses the numerator and denominator from the same level of geography. In other words, "county percent" means the numerator and denominator both reflect county data. "State percent" means the numerator and denominator both reflect state data.

Please carefully check the age group for each indicator.

In the definitions of data in the back of the book, the source of the data and contact person (if available) are listed. Census data from a sample of the population are reflected in "Summary File 3" data. These data are subject to sampling error. Census data from "Summary File 1" report values for the entire population.

Most of the data in ElderCount represent the calendar year 2000, although there are exceptions. Please check the data definitions.

Updating ElderCount

There are informal plans to update ElderCount every five years. Therefore, there is a possibility that the next Kansas ElderCount would be published in 2007, with data from 2005. The final decision will be made based in part on feedback from readers.

Please send your comments using the feedback form on the last page of this chart book.

Data Gaps

During the data-gathering phase of ElderCount, the Advisory Committee identified information that would have been helpful to policy makers, program planners, advocates, and educators, but were not available. The three most important data gaps are listed below, followed by other important data gaps.

Top Three Recommendations

Abuse, Neglect, and Exploitation

Currently there are no county-level data available that describe the number of older adults who experience abuse, neglect, or exploitation. We need data that compare abuse, neglect, and exploitation across settings (i.e., at home versus in a nursing home). It is also important to have data that describe the type of abuse, the age and gender of the person experiencing the abuse, and the age and gender of the person perpetrating the abuse. Without such data, it is not possible to target areas of the state for improvement.

Recommendation #1: The Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitative Services and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment should work together to develop one data collection form that could be used in nursing homes and in the community to collect data that would shed light on adult abuse, neglect, and exploitation trends in Kansas counties.

ElderCount Advisory Committee member Molly M. Wood explains adult abuse, neglect, and exploitation on page 16.

Population Projections

The state of Kansas needs an official set of population projections of the older adult population in order to plan appropriate services and set public policy.

Recommendation #2: The Division of the Budget (DOB) should produce and disseminate county population projections for older adult men and women ages 65-79 and 80+. It is also highly recommended that the DOB produce and disseminate population projections for the 85-89 and 90+ age groups at the

Area Agency on Aging level. The projections should be developed through 2040, and should be updated and disseminated every five years.

Difference between the Number of People Receiving Services and the Number Needing Services

Research has shown that in some cases, the need for nursing home care can be prevented or postponed if older adults receive appropriate services in the community. The services can be provided by family members or friends (informal), or by community-based organizations (formal). ElderCount reports the number of frail and low-income older adults receiving homeand community-based care. County data were not available, however, on the number of older adults in each county who wanted to receive services but did not, because they could not afford services, were on a waiting list for services, or services did not exist in their area. Such data are important for program planning.

Recommendation #3: The Kansas Department on Aging should collect and distribute county data describing the number of people who are eligible to and willing to receive HCBS/FE services but are not able to, and why.



Other Important Data Gaps

Economics

To further appreciate the economic status and impact of the older population, one would want to know more about assets and the wealth represented by home ownership and property holdings. Also of interest would be the taxes that elders pay, their wage and pension income, and the financial assistance that they give to other family members. The likelihood of living in or near poverty is related to age, race, and gender. Older women of color have among the highest rates of poverty in the country. County-level data describing the number of older men and women (by age cohort and race) whose income is below 150% of the federal poverty level is important information for program planners and policy makers. We were not able to locate such data. More finely detailed indicators of economic vulnerability, such as high housing or health expenditures, could focus attention on those Kansans in greatest need.

Health

Valid, reliable, and complete county-level data for some key health indicators were not available for ElderCount. In particular, we note the absence of county-level indicators for physical health status (exercise and physical activity), mental health (especially depression), social interaction (volunteerism and community or church participation), and prescription issues (pharmacy access and supplemental insurance for prescription drugs).

Informal Care

National data show that the majority of care provided to older adults to prevent or postpone the need for nursing home care comes from family members and friends. It would be helpful to know the extent to which older adults are receiving and providing informal care in Kansas counties, to better plan community-based services.

Transportation

Transportation needs of older adults are an important issue in rural as well as urban areas. It would be helpful to know the extent to which older adults are isolated or limit their activities because of transportation challenges.

Volunteerism

There is a lack of county data that report the extent to which older adults are contributing to their communities through volunteer efforts. Data needs include: how many older adults volunteer; how many hours per week; and in what capacity.

Abuse, Neglect, and Exploitation

This section is included because, despite the lack of county data, it is an area of great importance to the Eldercount Advisory Committee.

In Kansas, abuse, neglect, exploitation, and fiduciary abuse are defined by statute.¹ Abuse encompasses infliction of physical and mental injury, nonconsensual sexual acts, unreasonable physical or chemical restraints and isolation, and threatening or menacing conduct toward a vulnerable adult. Neglect, by contrast, is the omission or failure to ensure the safety and well-being of the older adult. The definition of neglect includes self-neglect, that is, one's own failure to avoid physical or mental harm and to provide for oneself. Exploitation and fiduciary abuse are misuse of the older adult's property and financial resources, although fiduciary abuse contains the added element of a position of trust held by the wrongdoer. The Kansas statutes also require certain professionals (see next page) to report suspected abuse, neglect, and exploitation to either the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS) or the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE).

Our burgeoning older adult population has affected every segment of the social, political and economic landscape including the extent to which vulnerable adults are subject to abuse, neglect, and exploitation. Nationally, approximately 450,000 elderly persons in domestic settings were abused or neglected during 1996, mostly by relatives, friends and neighbors.²

When elderly persons who experienced self-neglect were added, the number increased to approximately 551,000. Moreover, it is widely believed that elder abuse is under-reported,³ and the incidence of abuse of vulnerable older adults can be expected to increase.

When it comes to adult abuse, neglect, and exploitation, data describing the state of Kansas appear to mirror national data.⁴ Most confirmed perpetrators of adult abuse are well-known to the elder. For example, in fiscal year 2001, of 6,215 perpetrators, 1,306 (21%) were identified as the victim's spouse, family member, friend, or neighbor. A plurality (42%) of confirmed "perpetrators" were the victims themselves—victims of self-neglect. The majority (59%) of victims were women. Nine percent of older adult victims were age 90 or older.

Policy makers and professionals seeking to enhance services to frail, vulnerable adults need more data about this topic, specifically data available at the county level. Statewide data indicates the gender of all reported victims, but does not report the data by gender and age group. In fact, of all reported victims, 47.6% were under the age of 60. We know that the majority of reported adult abuse occurs in the victim's home, but the reported data do not indicate the location for abuse, neglect, or exploitation. Clearly, part of understanding and addressing the problem entails locating the abuse more precisely geographically and demographically as well as describing it more fully. The competition for scarce public and private resources requires identifying the ways in which those resources can benefit Kansas seniors most effectively. All the data collected, therefore, should be available by county, age group, and gender.

Persons Required to Report Suspected Abuse, Neglect, or Exploitation in Kansas

K.S.A. 39-1402. Institutional setting

SHALL report to Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE):

- Any person who is licensed to practice any branch of the healing arts
- A licensed psychologist
- A chief administrative officer of a medical care facility
- An adult care home administrator or operator
- A licensed social worker
- A licensed professional nurse
- A licensed practical nurse
- A teacher
- A bank trust officer
- A guardian or a conservator

K.S.A. 39-1431. Community setting

SHALL report to Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS):

- Any person who is licensed to practice any branch of the healing arts
- A licensed psychologist
- A licensed master level psychologist
- A chief administrative officer of a medical care facility
- An owner/operator of a residential care facility
- A licensed social worker
- A licensed professional nurse
- A licensed practical nurse
- A teacher
- A bank trust officer
- A guardian or a conservator
- A licensed dentist
- A law enforcement officer
- A case manager
- A rehabilitation counselor
- A holder of a power of attorney
- An independent living counselor
- The chief administrative officer of a licensed home health agency
- The chief administrative officer of an adult family home
- The chief administrative officer of a provider of community services and affiliates thereof

Criminal penalties may be imposed on mandatory reporters who fail to report suspected abuse, and neglect, or exploitation. Any person may report to KDHE or SRS.

Kansas Department of Aging

The Kansas Department on Aging (KDOA) was established by statute in 1977 as a cabinet-level executive agency. KDOA's mission is to assure security, dignity and independence for the elders of our state. Funding is provided through the Older Americans Act, Medicaid, United States Department of Agriculture, state general funds, local funds, fees, and donations.

KDOA administers programs through 11 Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs). The AAAs act as the single point of entry into the aging network to simplify access and paperwork (see next page).

KDOA has four long-range goals to promote the security, dignity, and independence of Kansas seniors:

- Healthy aging with personal and financial independence;
- A continuum of choices in services for seniors;
- High-quality services and supports at all levels of individual need; and
- Effective, efficient, and affordable services and supports.

The agency administers programs that provide a continuum of care, including information and referral, home delivered and congregate meals, inhome services, and nursing home care.

KDOA's major programs are:

Nursing homes. Nursing homes provide
health care and related services to individuals
requiring around-the-clock nursing care that
cannot be provided in their own homes.
KDOA reimburses nursing homes for
residents whose financial resources and
functional impairments meet the requirements
for Medicaid eligibility.

• In-home services. The Home and Community Based Services for the Frail Elderly (HCBS/FE) and the Senior Care Act are the two major programs that provide community-based services as an alternative to nursing home care. Examples of in-home services include: adult day care, sleep cycle support, personal emergency response system and installation, wellness monitoring via nurse visits, assistance with housecleaning, meal preparation, bathing, toileting, feeding, respite care, assistive technology, home modifications, and nurse evaluations.

The HCBS/FE program and programs through the Senior Care Act have different eligibility criteria. The HCBS/FE program is for people who are 65 or older and with low incomes (at or below the federal poverty guidelines), and less than \$2,000 in assets. Senior Care Act programs are targeted to people who are 60 years of age or older, who pay for services based on their income.

- Nutrition programs. KDOA funds a congregate meal program that provides meals at 317 sites in Kansas, and provides meals to people who are homebound.
- Pharmacy assistance program. This program reimburses qualified individuals for a portion of their annual prescription expenses, not to exceed \$1,200 per year for people aged 67 or older, with incomes between 100% and 150% of the poverty level.

KDOA maintains a Website, www.agingkansas.org, which provides access to information about all the programs KDOA offers, and includes many links to other aging-related groups.


Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs) are the primary resource for information and services for older adults and those who care for them. Eleven AAAs, collectively serve the state of Kansas. They are part of a national network of 648 AAAs established by Congress as part of the Older Americans Act of 1965. The Older Americans Act charges AAAs to "be the leader relative to all aging issues on behalf of all older persons in the area." Some AAA programs serve people age 60 and older, while other programs serve people age 65 and older. Services are also available to caregivers of an older adult.

AAAs are managed locally and because they are charged with addressing the unique needs of the communities they serve, while they share similarities, each is different. In Kansas, three of the AAAs operate within county government and eight are not-for-profit agencies. Funding comes from a variety of sources including local/county government, state government, federal government, contributions, grants, and contracts for services.

AAAs help to inform and educate older adults and those who care for them about the many services and resources available in the community. This information is provided over the phone and through the mail. In addition, well-trained AAA staff can provide an assessment to comprehensively review an older adult's needs, strengths, environment, and medical concerns. Assessments are usually conducted in the older adult's home, with other family members present. When completed, the assessor can offer options regarding available services. The AAAs strive to help older adults remain safe and independent as long as possible. If it becomes necessary for an older adult to consider living in a nursing facility, the AAAs can help with the transition.

To maximize funding, AAAs work in coordination and in cooperation with other agencies that serve older adults. Some services are provided directly by the AAAs, others are provided through other community agencies. In some instances, services provided by community agencies are funded in part by the AAAs. In all cases, independence and dignity for the older adult is the goal.



Population

Basic demographic data describing the age structure, sex distribution, and racial makeup of the state of Kansas is a backdrop to putting ElderCount information into perspective. With 2,688,418 people, the state of Kansas constitutes about 1% of the U.S. population. The population is dispersed among 105 counties. One third of all Kansans live in two counties, Johnson and Sedgwick, each with 17% of the state's population. Wyandotte and Shawnee each contain 6% of Kansans. On the other hand, 68 counties have less than one-half of one percent of the Kansas population.

The majority (64) of Kansas counties contain fewer than 2,000 older adults and 34 counties have 1,000 or fewer people age 65 or older. In fact, only 5 counties have more than 10,000 people age 65 or older:

Many rural counties have been experiencing a steady decline in total population for decades. The challenges of maintaining independence and autonomy in older adulthood vary by geographic locale. Older adults in rural areas and their families face a unique set of challenges when it comes to accessing health care and receiving community-based long-term care services (see page 24).

The following data are reported in the ElderCount chart book:

Population, 65+

The number and percent of the population age 65 and older is reported for each county and each AAA. With 271 people, Greeley county had the fewest older adults in 2000 compared to Sedgwick county, with 51,574 people age 65+. In general, rural areas have higher percentages of older adults, while urban areas have higher numbers. (See Maps 1 and 2.)

Race: nonwhite, 65+

Close to nine of ten people (all ages) who live in Kansas report their race to be white (86%). Among older adults, the percent is even higher (94.4%).

In ElderCount all people who reported their race to be Black or African American, American Indian or Alaska Native, Asian, Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander, or Other are reported as nonwhite.

The 2000 census enumerated close to 20,000 Kansans age 65+ whose race was reported as one of the above, the remaining 94% of older Kansans reported their race as white. Table 1 reports the number and percent of African Americans in the 10 largest counties.

Hispanic, 65+

The Census Bureau asked people to identify their race and then also to indicate whether they were of Hispanic origin. The latter is not considered a race. People of any race can be of Hispanic origin. In the 2000 census, 186,299 people (all ages) in Kansas reported Hispanic origin, or close to 7% of the population. There are 6,483 older adults of Hispanic origin in Kansas. (See Table 1.)

Men and Women, 85+

National data consistently report that among older adults, it is women age 85 and older who are the most likely to be living in or near poverty, have long-term care needs, and lack family support. While all older adults age 85 and older are not in need of assistance, it is important to recognize that those areas with higher numbers and higher percentages of people age 85+, in particular women age 85+, are likely to have special needs. (See Table 2.)

Registered to vote, 65+

Democracies work when major decisions reflect the will and values of the people. Voting is both a constitutional right and a responsibility. We report the number and percentage of older adults registered to vote, as a measure of how older adults contribute to society.

The well-being of older adults in Kansas cannot be fully understood without reference to the rural context. Factors that are of particular interest in rural areas include population shifts, accessibility to health care, the quality of health care providers, and informal networks.

Thirty-one of the counties in Kansas are described as frontier, with population densities of six or fewer people per square mile. Sixty-nine of the counties have population densities of 20 or fewer people per square mile. This represents over 65% of Kansas counties.

Rural areas continue to experience out-migration of younger people, who leave their hometowns to find employment in larger, more heavily populated areas.

Often, accessibility to health and long-term care services is lacking in rural areas because of the extensive traveling distances required and the harsh climate. Tertiary care can be accessed in rural settings; however, this usually involves driving to large medical centers that are located in more heavily populated areas anywhere from 1 to 5 hours from the rural older adult's home. One rural community has a population of 800 people, yet the three physicians in this community serve over 8,000 clients.

It is not unusual for a single home health agency to provide services for more than one county in the rural setting. Besides the driving time required to access the health care system in many areas of Kansas, weather conditions also impact access. It is not possible to travel 3 hours to a tertiary center during a winter storm without risking safety.

As younger workers move to larger cities for

employment, the well-being of older adults suffers the loss of highly skilled staff. Health care facilities struggle to provide quality care with a shortage of qualified health care workers. Maintaining expertise and experience in multiple areas of practice requires an enormous investment of human and monetary resources, which is difficult to achieve with both dwindling resources and health care reimbursement rates.


An equally important factor to well-being in the rural areas is the decrease of informal networks. Once the young family member leaves the small town for employment in a larger city, the older adult has fewer resources for daily assistance with personal care or help in other areas of daily living. Lacking assistance with grocery shopping, meal preparation, or laundry, the older adult in a rural area may actually find that the local nursing home is the only option.

Indeed, Kansas ranks higher than the national average of long-term care institutionalization of older adults. Older adults in rural areas may actually receive expensive long-term care that is at a higher level of care than what is necessary.

The challenges of rural life are woven into every aspect of well-being of the older adult. However, the picture is not without hope. Rural health providers have developed innovative methods to deal with the challenging rural context. Rural hospitals have provided specialized care through the development of outpatient clinics staffed by specialized physicians who travel to rural Kansas on a regular basis. Hospitals have incorporated physician clinics, dentist offices, long-term care and assisted living centers, and hospitals under one roof. Scholarship programs are recruiting, educating, and retaining qualified health care professionals. Nursing homes are diversifying services to include assisted living and communitybased services


Kansas citizens continue to innovate and create as they strive to provide for the well-being of elders in rural settings.

Economics

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Economic security is fundamental to the well-being of older adults. Security includes not only the maintenance of an adequate income but also the ability to make choices about paid and volunteer work. The economic security of elders also benefits our communities, allowing older citizens to live independently and productively while they contribute their resources and experience to other generations.

Many developments during the latter decades of the 20th century helped reduce poverty and inequality among older people, but some groups remain at risk. Above all, financial status in later life is a harvest of earlier circumstances, so steps to promote education, employment, and savings at all ages will ultimately benefit the elders of the 21st century.

The economic well-being of older Kansans is difficult to summarize because it can differ markedly by such characteristics as age, sex, marital status, ethnicity, and living arrangements. For ElderCount, we have included information that describes the employment, income, and economic vulnerability of older adults. We also emphasize that older adults, as a group, can be a significant economic force in their counties.

The ElderCount chart book includes the following economic indicators. More information about these items can be found in the "Data Definitions" section at the back of the book.

• Labor force participation describes persons who are working (employed) or actively looking for work (unemployed). Despite a long-term trend toward retirement at earlier ages, substantial numbers of persons work into their late 60s, though increasingly in part-time

positions. At ages 65-69, men are more likely to work than women. Men's labor force participation ranged from 16% in Norton County to 75% in Greeley County. In 24 Kansas counties at least 50% of noninstitutionalized men ages 65-69 were in the labor force in 2000.

Women's labor force participation ranged from 10% in Wallace County to 52% in Hamilton County. Hamilton County was the only county with more than half of women ages 65-69 in the labor force. These figures cannot tell us why people remain in the labor force—whether to gain satisfaction from working or out of economic need.

- Median household income is one indicator of the financial resources that are available to an area's households headed by older adults. The figure here counts 1999 income from Social Security, assets, pensions, earnings, and other sources. Half of households have an income below the median, and half have an income above. Economic well-being depends not only on income, but also on net worth and the expenses that are faced at these ages. Median household income for householders age 65-74 ranged from a low of \$21,324 in Trego County to \$45,098 in Johnson County. For householders age 75 and older the range was from \$13,523 (Elk) to \$54,531 (Grant).
- Persons living in poverty face difficulty affording such necessities as food, housing, and health care. People are classified as "poor" when their income or that of their family falls below a relevant income threshold defined by the Census Bureau, in this case for 1999. Among older adults, rates of poverty are higher among women and at older ages. Two counties (Greeley and Wichita) had no men 75+ living in poverty according to 2000 census data, while 16% of men 75+ in Allen and Scott counties were in poverty. Six counties had 100 or more

men 75+ living in poverty with Sedgwick County leading the list with 452 men.

There were 36 counties with at least 100 women age 75+ living in poverty. Sedgwick had 1,407, Wyandotte 817, and Johnson County 650 women age 75 and older living in poverty. Although Johnson County had the third highest number of women in poverty, it also had the third lowest percent of women living in poverty (6%).

Ten counties had 20% or more of women 75+ in poverty. The two highest were Elk (31%) and Atchison (32%) (see Maps 3 and 4).

- Medicaid enrollment is another indicator of economic vulnerability. This state-administered program helps low-income persons obtain health coverage including long-term care. It assists older adults with their Medicare premiums, other costs, and long-term care services. Older Kansans qualify for the program if annual incomes fall below a designated threshold. The number of people age 65+ enrolled in Medicaid ranged from 30 (Lane) to 5,692 (Sedgwick). The percentage ranged from 7% (in 4 counties) to 26% in Chautauqua.
- Total Social Security payments to persons age 65+, annualized for 2000. This is the amount of money in Social Security payments to older adults who live in the county (or AAA). Because the total does not include early retirement benefits to persons aged 62 to 64 and does not include survivor or disability benefits to younger persons, the reported figure actually understates the Social Security income to the county. County income from this source in 2000 ranged from \$3 million (Wallace) to \$530 million (Sedgwick). Altogether, Kansans age 65 and older received \$3.4 billion in Social Security benefits in 2000.

• Percentage of the area's total personal income from Social Security benefits to persons aged 65+, 2000. Personal income is the sum (before taxes) of the income received by all adults from earnings, rents, dividends, interest, and transfer payments. This percentage indicates the share of the area's total income that comes from Social Security payments to people age 65 and older. Social Security is the source of 10% or more of the total (all ages) personal income of some counties (see Map 5).

"Poor" and "Near Poor" in Kansas


Every March, the federal government collects data on income from a sample of 50,000 households in the United States, through the Current Population Survey (CPS).

Averaging the CPS data for 1998, 1999, and 2000, the federal government estimates that about 8% of Kansans age 65+ were living below the poverty level (annual income for 1 person age 65+ of \$8,200 or less) and 20% were living within 150% of the poverty line (annual income for 1 person age 65+ at \$12,300 or less).


Map 3. Percentage of Men Age 75+, in Poverty: 1999



The Health Subcommittee selected data that could be useful in monitoring healthcare needs and for planning purposes. The variables are: (1) annual mammography for women, (2) hospitalization for cardiovascular care (specific DRGs, excluding stroke), (3) hospitalization for hip fractures (due to accidental injury, including falls), and (4) the number of people age 18+ (adults) per full-time equivalent (FTE) physician.

Keeping track of these health indicators can serve immediate and long-term needs. In the short term, counties with apparent elevated rates of hospitalization for cardiovascular disease and hip fractures can be targeted for follow up to determine validity and underlying causes. Given the impact of these medical conditions on quality of life for older adults, public health strategies to reduce the burden of illness and risks for premature mortality, morbidity, disability, and long-term care needs should be a high priority. The same strategy and rationale applies to those areas with low rates of mammography. Variation in FTE primary care physician rates might serve as an incentive to determine if access to care is a problem for older adults in some counties.

In the long term, these health data can serve as a baseline for tracking trends and the impact of health care initiatives. Tracking temporal change would then provide a basis for forecasting future needs. It is expected that disease incidence and prevalence, along with hospitalization and aftercare resource needs associated with these conditions, are likely to increase as the population ages.

The ElderCount chart book includes the following variables. Please refer to the "Data Definitions" section at the back of the book for more information.

Mammography—Annual Rates*

Breast cancer is the leading cause of cancer death for women Medicare beneficiaries. The risk increases with age. Women age 65+ have a sevenfold increase in risk relative to younger women. Early detection through regular mammograms and clinical breast exams, followed by early treatment is the most effective means for enhancing prognosis and reducing the number of deaths due to breast cancer.

Medicare now pays for annual mammogram screening for women.

Statewide in 2000, 44.5% of non-HMO Kansas women age 65-84 received mammography services paid by Medicare. County-specific rates varied threefold from 19.4% to 60.4%. Efforts to increase screening mammography rates among female Medicare beneficiaries are a national priority for the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Counties can partner with state and national initiatives to increase the number of women who receive mammograms. (See Map 6.)

Hospitalization for Cardiovascular Care*

Heart disease, the major component of cardiovascular illness, is the leading cause of hospitalization and indeed death among persons age 65+ in Kansas and the United States. Substantial disability, activity limitation, increased burden of care, reduced quality of life, and the need for nursing home care can accompany the disease. While county-specific prevalence rates for cardiovascular disease among older adults are not routinely monitored, aggregate hospital admission rates for cardiovascular conditions derived from Medicare databases were calculated and used as a proxy to determine geographic variation.

Statewide in the year 2000, 7.2% of male and 5.9% of female non-HMO Kansans age 65+ were hospitalized for cardiovascular care.

County-specific rates varied over fourfold, ranging from 3.1% to 12.7% for males and 3.1% to 12.5% for females. Higher rates might indicate one or more factors, including a higher prevalence of disease in the county, greater acuity, and less disease management. This interpretation can be confounded with access to care issues (higher rates could, in some instances, reflect better access to care).

• Hospitalization for Hip Fracture*

Deaths, hospitalization, subsequent disability, and need for nursing home care are major issues associated with unintentional injury among the elderly. Advanced age is reported to substantially increase the likelihood of fall-related injuries, of which hip fracture is a major outcome. The literature states that half of those persons suffering hip fracture will not regain previous levels of function.

Statewide in 2000 among non-HMO covered older adults (age 75+) with Medicare, there were 8.8 cases per 1,000 males and 17.4 cases per 1,000 females hospitalized for hip fracture. County-specific rates varied from none to 40.4 per 1,000 for males and from none to 39.7 per 1,000 for females. Counties with higher rates of hip fractures need follow up to rule out statistical artifact and rule in definite causes. Where falls/accidents are the major cause, one might consider multifaceted public health efforts to reduce falls, consisting of education, exercise, medication review, risk factor reduction, and home safety modifications. (See Map 7.)

• FTE PC Physician (Population 18+ per FTE Physician)

This variable reports the number of people age 18 and older (the adult population) per primary care physician. (See data definitions for description of primary care physicians.) In Kansas the number varies from 499 in

McPherson to 9,877 in Cheyenne County. Rural areas in general, have fewer physicians per adult population. We decided to report this number, per 1,000 people age 18+ (rather than age 65+) because the vast majority of these physicians care for all adults, not just older adults. The likelihood of needing physician services varies by age. Younger adults (those in their 20s and 30s) as a group, use less physician services than older adults. (See Map 8.)




Map 6. Percentage of Women Age 65-84, Receiving a Mammogram: 2000


Map 7. Number of Hip Fractures per 1,000 Women Age 75+: 2000

Community Living

The community living indicators are used to monitor the status of the vast majority of older adults who live in and are a vital part of our communities. Most older adults want to remain in their homes even if they need long-term care. The availability of necessary services, housing options, and an elder-ready community infrastructure can help older adults remain in their homes. Women have a longer life expectancy and are much less likely than men to have an adequate retirement income, so most in-home service recipients and nursing home residents are very old women. The average age of in-home service recipients is 80.5 years.

Because older adults in Kansas are institutionalized in all age categories at rates higher than the national average, it is important to monitor the progress in creating an environment in every Kansas county that allows older adults the option of community living. Older adults contribute significant amounts of their incomes, and financial and personal assets to our communities.

Living Alone

This indicator is included in ElderCount because it highlights the potential need for both informal and formal support for older adults, primarily very old women, who live alone. Most of the long-term care provided to older adults is informal care, typically provided by family members, usually wives and daughters. Nationally, it is estimated that over \$190 billion of informal care is provided annually. Research indicates that in Kansas, many older adults living alone actually have significant family support nearby, and for middle income older adults, living alone may be indicative of sufficient resources to maintain separate living arrangements proximate to caregivers. *It is the*

combination of low income and living alone that is related to increased risk of institutionalization.\(^1\) However, family mobility, increasing numbers of women holding full-time jobs, and the exodus of young people from many rural communities makes monitoring the extent to which older adults have access to informal sources of support a critical issue. Older adults living alone is a proxy for this issue. According to Census 2000, there were 105,689 Kansans age 65 and older living alone. Most (77%) older Kansans living alone are women. (See Maps 9 and 10.)

Disability

Indicators of disability provide information about the potential need for long-term care services. Keeping track of changes in disability level over time will provide insight into the type and amount of preventive services and treatment that will be necessary in the future. The information for this indicator was derived from U.S. Census 2000 data and combines information on physical, mental, and emotional conditions lasting six months or more that make it difficult to perform activities of daily living. About 41% of older Kansans are considered to have a disability. Census data reveal that in 2000 there were 56,504 older men in Kansas with a disability and 80,584 older women.

In-Home Services in the Community

This indicator tracks the provision of in-home public long-term care services administered by the Kansas Department on Aging (KDOA) on behalf of older adults. Services funded through the following sources are included: the Older Americans Act (federal); State General Funds; and Home and Community Based Services for the Frail Elderly (federal/state through Medicaid). In Kansas there were over 21,000 (5.9%) older adults receiving in-home services in 2000. The

percentage varies from 3.3 in AAA-11 (Johnson County) to 10.2 in AAA-5. (See Map 11.)

Services (Medicaid) for Frail Elders, 65+ (HCBS/FE)

This indicator tracks the extent to which very lowincome frail older adults in our communities are being served with federal as well as state funds. Older adults with very low incomes and significant functional limitations can receive home- and community-based services through this Medicaid Home- and Community-Based Services/ Frail Elders (HCBS/FE) waiver program funded jointly with federal and state dollars if they would otherwise be eligible for nursing facility care. Because this program is not totally reliant on state dollars, scarce state dollars available for in-home services can be leveraged to provide more services. People eligible for this program are the older adults with the fewest resources for purchasing formal services privately. When home- and community-based services are unavailable, these older adults are at greater risk for entering a nursing home where they will be completely dependent on public funds, even when their needs could be met much more cost effectively in the community. The persons reflected in this statistic are also included in the previous indicator, "in-home services in the community." In 2000, 7,206 older adults (age 65+) received these services. This represents about 2% of older adults.

Medicaid Average Individual Monthly HCBS/FE Payment

This indicator tracks the average monthly amount of money paid by the Medicaid HCBS/FE program on behalf of a client who qualifies based on low-income and high risk for needing nursing home care (see previous indicator). If the older adult is considered eligible for HCBS/FE on the basis of low-income and frailty, the HCBS/FE program provides services (including personal care, household tasks and health services) to assist the individual in remaining in the community. This help can postpone or prevent the need for living in a nursing home. The average amount represents the costs paid by the HCBS/FE program,

and does *not* reflect the total cost of remaining in the community. The HCBS/FE program receives funding from federal and state dollars. Statewide the average monthly payment made by Medicaid on behalf of an individual's HCBS/FE services is \$750, although there is a wide range among AAAs and counties.

Assisted Living Beds

This indicator monitors the availability of assisted living beds. Assisted living provides a less intensive alternative to nursing home care for people with long-term care needs. The number of assisted living and residential care beds increased in Kansas by 36% between 1997 and 1999.²

The distribution of assisted living beds is uneven. In some areas there are too many assisted living beds, which can contribute to unnecessarily high rates of use, thereby draining financial resources from less restrictive community-based services. In other areas of Kansas, especially in many rural areas and in low-income urban areas, access to assisted living is severely limited.³ If assisted living options (and community-based services) are not available, higher rates of nursing home use can be expected.

Higher rates of nursing home use can also be expected when waiting lists for community-based services grow long, as often happens commensurate with state budget shortfalls. In 2000 there were 6,146 assisted living beds licensed in Kansas, with a statewide occupancy rate of 68 percent, according to the "Adult Care Home Annual Report."

Community Living

Documenting the effect of waiting lists for in-home services on nursing home admissions is particularly important so that policy makers can determine if state funds were actually saved or if more state money was spent on higher cost nursing facility care because home- and community-based services were not available when needed. The Office of Aging and Long Term Care at the University of Kansas School of Social Welfare has been tracking many of these indicators each year for the last eight years, thus trends can be examined historically (www.oaltc.ku.edu/ ResearchReports.htm).

In order for older adults to have their long-term care needs met in the least restrictive setting, communitybased services and alternative settings such as assisted living need to be available across the state.

These indicators will help us to better understand elder Kansans who live in our community. However, at this time we only have available data to tell a small part of their story. Development of data sources and indicators that provide a full picture of the needs and contributions of older adults in our community is necessary to effectively plan for the growing number of Kansas' older adults.

Older Adults at Risk for Mursing Home Placement

Information describing community-based services to older adults at high risk for nursing home placement is important. The Kansas Department on Aging collects data on people who are at high risk for nursing home placement and who remain in the community with the help of community-based services. These data are reported in Table 3, at the AAA level. Because many counties have low numbers of people "diverted" (see note below table) county data are not reported in ElderCount.

CARE Assessment

In Kansas, older adults seeking admission to nursing facilities must have a CARE assessment prior to admission. CARE stands for Client Assessment Referral and Evaluation. The CARE Assessment is used to evaluate the extent to which long-term care needs may be able to be met outside of a nursing home. Table 3 reports the number of people who received a CARE assessment in fiscal year 2001, and the percentage of people living in the community with services on the 30th day after the CARE Assessment. These people (2,038 in Kansas) are considered "diverted from nursing home care."






Map 10. Percentage of Women Age 65+, Living Alone: 2000

Mussing Homes

There are over 350 nursing homes and hospital long-term care units in Kansas providing around-the-clock nursing care and supervision for some of our most frail older adults. Recent years have witnessed a decline in the number of nursing home residents, due to the implementation of an aggressive prescreening program and increased availability of community-based services. However, most experts agree that high-quality, facility-based long-term care will continue to meet important needs for the foreseeable future.

The typical resident of a Kansas nursing home is a widowed woman in her mid-eighties, with multiple chronic and in some cases acute health conditions. The staff will help her with, on average, at least three activities of daily living such as using the restroom, eating, and transferring from bed to chair. She likely has a history of falls, and takes nine or more medications per day. This overview of the "typical" resident illustrates that nursing home care is the most resource-intense form of long-term care and, as such, the most costly.

Over half of all nursing home care provided in Kansas is reimbursed through Medicaid, the federal and state funded medical program for people who are financially impoverished. State policy makers grapple with forging public policy that is fiscally sound while meeting the needs of the increasing numbers of frail older adults.

Many persons are under the false impression that Medicare pays for most nursing home care. In fact, Medicare reimburses for only a small fraction of skilled care, and only under specific conditions. When Medicare does pay for nursing home care, it does so for a limited number of days.

Contemporary nursing homes care for two groups of people. One group consists of people who have been admitted for long-term care due to advanced or multiple chronic conditions and decline in functional ability. Many of these persons have dementia. These nursing home residents will likely live out their remaining months and years in the nursing home setting. The other group consists of people who are admitted to a nursing home for days or weeks of rehabilitation following an injury or acute illness, and then will return to the community to live. Years ago, before reimbursement incentives changed to encourage shorter hospitalizations, people in the latter group would have likely remained in the hospital longer and avoided a nursing home stay altogether.

Nursing homes are the most heavily regulated segment of health care, at both the federal and state levels. Since the 1960s nursing homes have provided care and services based on a medical model that, in many ways, mimics the hospital environment. Currently, many nursing homes are in the process of making the transition to a new model of care in which resident choice and control are central, the physical and social environments are smaller and more like home, and frontline staff members are more actively involved in decision-making.

ElderCount Variables

Most of the Kansas ElderCount nursing home data come from the MDS (Minimum Data Set; see page 42). All Kansas nursing homes and hospital long-term care units certified to receive Medicare and/or Medicaid funding submit an annual cost report to the state, as well as a quarterly functional assessment on every resident (the MDS). The nursing home indicators were selected to assist policy makers, program planners, consumers, and long-term care providers to track the characteristics of nursing home residents and nursing homes, and to develop sound policy and high-quality, cost-effective programs and services.

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The ElderCount chart book includes the following indicators. Please check the "Data Definitions" section in the back of the book.

• Beds (licensed) and occupancy rate

The number of nursing home beds varies from county to county. The occupancy rate in Kansas counties range from 23% in Kearny County to 95% or higher in eight counties (Rice, McPherson, Chautauqua, Ellsworth, Logan, Sherman, Lane, Harper, and Shawnee). Both occupancy rate and resident capacity (i.e., beds registered with the state as being available for service) have declined overall in the past decade.

• Residents, 65+

This figure reports the number of older adults in Kansas nursing homes or in hospital long-term care units on April 1, 2000. State wide there were close to 20,000 people in nursing home beds, according to MDS data. Most older adults, especially those under the age of 80, do not live in a nursing home, but many will spend some time in a nursing home for rehabilitation needs. This number reflects both nursing home residents who are receiving long-term care and people admitted to the nursing home for days or weeks of rehabilitation.

• Residents (men and women reported separately), 75+

In Kansas—as in the United States in general—most nursing home residents are women. MDS data reveal 4,232 men age 75+ and 14,023 women age 75+ in nursing homes in Kansas on April 1, 2000. The likelihood of needing nursing home care increases with age. It follows that counties with relatively high proportion of people age 75+, such as many rural counties, can be expected to have somewhat higher rates of nursing home use (see Maps 12 and 13).

• Residents, 65+ (total during 2000)

While around 5% of older adults are in a nursing home on any given day, the percent who spent at least one night in a nursing home during 2000 ranged from less than 2% in Logan County to 23% in Pratt County. This statistic provides a sense of the turnover in contemporary nursing homes now that more people are being admitted for shorter rehabilitation stays (compare the number of people in a nursing home during 2000 with the number of beds).

• Medicaid, 65+ (total during 2000)

Statewide about half (47%) of people age 65+ who were in a nursing home for any amount of time during 2000 received help paying for at least part of their care from Medicaid.

Medicaid average monthly payment

Medicaid is a federal/state program that pays toward nursing home care for people without necessary resources to pay fully for their care. Medicaid payments vary by nursing home based on the nursing home's costs to provide care. Cost differences can reflect variations in resident acuity (very sick residents require more resources than less sick residents), staffing levels and compensation, and other costs. The average Medicaid monthly payment for an individual in a nursing home in 2000 was around \$2,000, with a range of less than \$1,500 in Linn and Washington counties to a high of \$2,506 in Harvey County. Nursing home Medicaid payments cannot be directly compared to community-based Medicaid payments because the cost for room and board is included in the nursing home cost, but not for people receiving community-based care. Also, in general, nursing home residents have more serious care needs than persons receiving services in the community.

The Minimum Data Set (MDS)


The 1986 Institute of Medicine report on the nation's nursing homes included a recommendation that the federal government develop a standardized, comprehensive assessment to be used in certified nursing facilities. Congress included this requirement in the Nursing Home Reform Act of 1987. The Minimum Data Set (MDS) was developed over a three-year period. Kansas nursing facilities began to use the MDS in October 1990. Transmission of MDS data to a state repository was initiated in 1991.

The MDS contains information about the characteristics of individual residents and the types and levels of service residents need to achieve the highest level of practical functioning. Nursing facility staff use this information to develop a plan of care for the resident. State and federal inspectors use the MDS to analyze how the care provided by the facility has affected the resident. Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement for a resident's stay in a nursing facility is determined, in part, by the results of the MDS assessments.

For the first time, facilities, government officials, and the public had access to information about the characteristics of residents who lived in the nation's nursing facilities. Studies using MDS data have demonstrated significant improvements in the quality of care provided to residents over the past decade. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) is using MDS data to prepare reports for consumers about the outcomes of care in each certified nursing facility. These reports will be posted on the CMS Website in the fall of 2002.

Map 12. Percentage of Men Age 75+ in a Nursing Home: 2000







Map 13. Percentage of Women Age 75+ in a Nursing Home: 2000





The four activity categories were: (a) learning, remembering, or concentrating (mental disability); (b) dressing, bathing, or getting around inside the home (self-care disability); (c) going outside the home alone to shop or visit a doctor's office (going outside the home disability); and (d) working at a job or business (employment disability).

Individuals were classified by the Census as having a disability if any of the following three conditions was true: (1) they were five years old and over and had a response of "yes" to a sensory, physical, mental, or self-care disability; (2) they were 16 years old and over and had a response of "yes" to going outside the home disability; or (3) they were 16 to 64 years old and had a response of "yes" to employment disability.



Example: Suppose there are 153 licensed beds and over the course of the year there were 37,014 bed days. Divide 37,014 by 55,845 (the total potential bed days, i.e., 153 beds x 365 days) = .6627. Multiply this by 100, for a 66% occupancy rate.

The Kansas Adult Care Home Regulations defines assisted living facilities as: any place or facility caring for six or more individuals not related within the third degree of relationship to the administrator, operator, or owner by blood or marriage and who, by choice or due to functional impairments, may need personal care and may need supervised nursing care to compensate for activities of daily living limitations and in which the place or facility includes apartments for residents and provides or coordinates a range of services including personal care or supervised nursing care available 24 hours a day, seven days a week for the support of resident independence. The provision of skilled nursing procedures to a resident in an assisted living facility is not prohibited by Kansas law. Generally, the skilled services provided in an assisted living facility shall be provided on an intermittent or limited term basis, or if limited in scope, on a regular basis (K.S.A. 39-923, 1997).

Note: Residential health care facilities provide individual living units, whereas assisted living facilities provide apartments.

NURSING HOMES

Reader's notes:

- * These data are reported by the county where the nursing home is located.
- * The vast majority of nursing homes in Kansas are both state certified and licensed for Medicaid or Medicare. Of the close to 400 nursing homes in Kansas in 2000, fewer than ten were licensed, but not Medicaid or Medicare certified. Nursing homes that are licensed, and Medicaid and/or Medicare certified are represented in Kansas ElderCount except for item #30 in which case licensed beds are included, whether they are certified or not. Also, nursing facilities primarily for people with mental health problems or mental retardation are not included in ElderCount.
- * In order for the state total to be accurate, these data represent an unduplicated count. If a person was in a nursing home in more than one county, that person is counted in the county of the last nursing home residence in 2000.
- * The AAA and Kansas nursing home values are summaries of county data. Therefore because some numbers are not reported at the county level (to protect confidentiality) the AAA and Kansas values are under reported.
- * Nursing home defined: According to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, a nursing home—also called a nursing facility—is defined as: any place or facility operating 24 hours a day, seven days a week, caring for six or more individuals not related within the third degree of relationship to the administrator or owner by blood or marriage and who, due to functional impairments, need skilled nursing care to compensate for activities of daily living limitations. - * The term "nursing home" is used in ElderCount because that is the term used by most of the people who live there and their families.
